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e have reached the end of the XVII General Chapter. It has been a time of intense research, listening, and comparing (experiences and opinions, ideas) leading to discernment. We followed a shared step-by-step process to construct together a formative path, a commitment for us all for the next six-year term.

We were all invited and provoked to:

- ✓ foster a new style of leadership, to live processes in which the service of authority always remains at the school of interior and exterior listening to the life of the sisters and brothers we meet in ministries and beyond
- ✓ to remain in a state of continuous formation, "learning to learn", without assuming that you have already arrived
- ✓ to be witnesses of a fresh, transformed, and transforming missionary religious life because it is nourished by the humanity of the Gospel and therefore capable of being human, respecting, forgiving,

welcoming, caring with kindness, patience, and parrhesia.

In these 24 days of the Chapter, we have received many words: those exchanged at the round table discussions, those heard and welcomed in the daily Eucharist celebrations, those of our friends and our Sisters, and of course, those words that will never forget, the words of the Holy Father during the audience on Friday 26th. August.

Closeness.

Compassion.

Tenderness.

This is the style of God, the style that Magdalene embodied and asked us to live. Closeness, compassion, and tenderness: towards those who are called to serve the Institute in decision-making positions, in the awareness that we are all fragile.

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"Living in the world with the heart of a barefoot apostle"

Interview with our new Mother General Sr. Sandra Maggiolo

Mother Sandra, after several years as a General Counselor, this year the Institute Chapter has entrusted you with the leadership of the Canossian family. How are you living this moment?

There is still a profound sense of disproportion the feeling of a sort gap within me. I don't really know how to describe it; however, I am aware that I often find myself repeating Peter's words when invited by Jesus to come to Him while walking on water. He said: "Lord, save me!". Perhaps it is the desire to shift attention from me to the Lord; the initiative is his, and it was he who said "Come". Other words that accompany and sustain me in this new service are "Freely you have received, freely give". For free!

Thinking back to the experience of the Chapter

... what is the strongest memory you still have in your mind's eye? (The strongest visual moment) ..of all the words you heard which are those that remain strongest in your memory

(the most significant words) ... what is left in your heart (the most emotional moment)

The election hit me like a kind of "overwhelming tsunami", especially in the days following the appointment. It seemed like I was suddenly carrying a load; things that were not part of me, almost like references in a text, reference-

es that should be attributed to someone else. This was certainly not a familiar feeling and at times I felt it too much for me. But then again, I know that this position is like others just a service.

Thinking back to those moments and to the rich Chapter theme: "Women of the Word who love without measure. Reconfiguration to a life of holiness for the mission today", many emotions and images emerge... I think I can recognize three moments which are impressed on my soul:

- 1. The embrace of the sisters immediately after the election
- 2. The meeting with Pope Francis.
- 3. The moment I received the definitive mandate

Greeting the Sisters one by one, our eyes meeting as I said their names, was like embracing a piece of God in each of them. As I allowed myself to be embraced by them in turn, I perceived a little of their faith, their hopes, some of their apostolic concerns, and the desire of each of us to be witnesses of the humanity of the Gospel by returning there, where the mission calls us to serve with a love that has no measure.

The meeting with Pope Francis was a unique event and it is impossible for me to express the emotions I felt. Deep in my soul I carry the memory of his gaze and the intense look of a person who really listens. I do not hide the fact that,

I also hold on to something that he recommended me to do and which I feel is closely connected to an expression that St. Magdalen held dear: "the air of Monte Baldo". The Holy Father recommended that I keep up the "good humor in the Sisters" and, honestly, day after day, I understand how wise it is to know how to cultivate this attitude in facing daily challenges.

For you what is the most powerful message that Magdalen gives to her daughters?

I'll answer it with Jesus' own words is a matter of loving God with all my heart and my neighbor as myself because in every brother and sister there is God who asks for help, God who asks my humanity to make itself a welcoming, compassionate, and open home.

It is a matter of entering into the way Jesus Crucified loves, he who, on the cross, was stripped of everything except his love. In a state of the utmost powerlessness, He continues to love without measure. Letting yourself be attracted and moved continuously by such Freedom is a great gift.

What is Maddalena's most current message for today's world? I say this with a phrase of her Spiritual Director, Fr Luigi Libera: "Live in the world with the heart of a barefoot Carmelite" What does it mean? And how?

For Magdalene, living in the world with a poor and simple heart meant leaving the monastery to live among the people, with a heart that was all for God and everything for others.

For us and for those who are involved today in this gift and charism it is a question of "giving shape" to a heart capable of loving and inhabiting the complexity of the world: we must not flee, nor sublimate, nor estrange ourselves nor defend ourselves from the postmodern, from social networks, from this world so contradictory, inhospitable yet so in need of the humanity of the Gospel.

A barefoot heart is an exposed, vulnerable heart, which allows itself to be touched by the non-love of history, in the suffering and tenacious certainty that, only in this way, something of the beating of God's own heart can be experienced.

The desire is to enter more and more into this prophecy that continues over time: to be Canossian in the world with a heart capable of loving God and neighbor very much, without measure, serving the little ones like Jesus who "loved us and gave himself for us" (Gal 2:20), for me.

et us praise Jesus and Mary!

I am Sr Albertina Luis dos
Santos, born on 17 September
1966 at Madalena in Sao Tomé (Africa), daughter of Celestino dos Santos
and Antonia Luis, affectionately called
Rosa. I have ten brothers and one sister.

At the age of 14, I heard the call to religious life but the dream became reality only later.

The Biblical quote that drew my attention was from Matthew 10:8, "Freely you have received, freely give". The phrase has been an invitation to infinitely open my heart, the horizon in my life, and to enter the divine intimacy giving myself to others with joy. I understood that there is no limited love, rather, love has to be universal – my brother and sister are all those God places beside me in whatever place.

Immediately after my religious profession I was sent to Angola where I stayed for sixteen years. Then I returned to Sao Tomé and then was sent to Togo as Mistress of Novices. Now I am called to a new mission, a new experience for which I am preparing myself.

In my 26 years of Canossian religious Life, I have many reasons to thank God who has called me to collaborate in his vineyard and also for those who have accompanied me in my vocation, helping me to discover and to realize God's plan in my life as a woman and as a religious.

What has marked my life have been prayer, joy, interior peace, fraternal life

and the apostolate. I am aware that when God passes by God leaves an experience of joy and this is very strong in me.

It is also from the fraternal sharing of who I am and what I have, that I am called to "make Jesus known and loved" to my brothers and sisters in living love and care towards others. During my experience, little by little, I understood that my heart is made for God, and God won't be satisfied by anything else. With St Magdalene of Canossa I too say that God has given us a great gift in giving us the vocation to this holy Institute. It is a call and, at the same time, a responsibility.

I am very grateful and aware of this and every day I ask for the grace to allow myself to be led, to be moulded more and more by God, certain that my identification with Christ Crucified will end when I will see him face to face.

¶he "Yes" I pronounced on the day of my First Vows, 28 June 1992, led me to journey along different paths to serve the Lord in many people who are now part of my consecrated life. Thirty years later I pronounce again my "Yes" in accepting to become part of the community of the General Council, at the service of the Institute's unity (RL 91). I was born on 6 August 1968. Together with my parents, Raúl and Marina, and my elder brother Eduardo, we have lived a beautiful experience of family life in the city of Mar del Plata, Argentina, where I grew up and when, at the age of 20 years of age, I joined the pre-novitiate.

"I will come to the altar of God, the God who is the joy of my life" (Psalm 43:4) has been the first verse that has remained fixed in my heart. It was a God who filled my life with meaning, fullness and love; a God whom I began to seek, even if in reality he was seeking me.

I spent two years discerning my vocation while being accompanied by a Diocesan priest who introduced me to the Canossian Sisters. On the first day I visited them, I remained surprised by the "joy" that they radiated and by their spontaneity with which they related. I immediately felt at home with the life of St Magdalene and with the mission of the Institute, especially in the desire to evangelize and to care for the sick, in which I prepared myself both profes-



Then I reflect on the Chapter theme the image that comes to my mind is that of a river. A river gets its life from the source and keeps flowing until it becomes one with the great ocean. While flowing, it shares its life with all, without any distinction. The river is full, shallow or empty, depending on the inflow from the source.

God, (in the Scriptures and in the realities of life) is the source of our spiritual life. Personal sanctification and sanctification of others is our goal. The context in which we live our spirituality are our communities and ministries. The way we express our spirituality is through our being and loving. The quality of our spirituality will show the quality of our life and love – a love without measure or a love that is measured and conditional.

The other day we heard in the Chapter room a unanimous longing for a spirituality, rather than multiplying our prayers and devotions. I have heard this desire being expressed time and again by



sisters in our communities and in different groups. It was indeed a touch of the Spirit. I greatly desire for me and for the Institute, that we strengthen a spirituality that is deeply rooted in the person of Jesus, a spirituality that becomes a way of life, a spirituality that goes beyond saying prayers, but that gets expressed in our everyday realities - as transparency, truthfulness, ethical conscience, readiness to let go of our plans and make adjustments, other centredness, spirit of sacrifice, willingness to receive and give feedback and so on. According to me, this is an ongoing process of a life of holiness, becoming more and more authen-

The new General Council: sr. Melissa Dwyer

! My name is Sr Melissa Dwyer and I come from Australia. I was born in Sydney and have one younger sister. My parents moved to Brisbane when I was 2 years old, and it was here that I grew up and completed my education. I met the Canossian Sisters when I was 19 as they were running retreats for young people. I attended a few of these retreat days, and shortly after I was given the opportunity to volunteer in Africa for one month with VOICA, I went to Tanzania and worked with homeless young people. During this time, confronted with my own inability to help those in greatest need, I discovered my vocation to serve God and serve the poor. Inspired by this desire to give my life radically and completely to Jesus, I came back to Australia and began my journey of initial formation with the Canossian Daughters of Charity. During my time as a postulant, I finished my university studies as a Secondary School Physical Education and English teacher.

Following my first profession of vows in 2005, I taught at a school in Brisbane for three years. Following this, as a Junior Sister, my application for a vocation 'ad gentes' was accepted and I was asked to serve in Malawi, East Africa. In 2008 I left Australia and spent 7.5 years in Malawi, most of the time as Principal of Bakhita Secondary School in Balaka. I enjoyed this experience of serving in mission very much.

In 2016 I was asked by Mother General to return to Australia and assist with the newly formed Delegation of Australia. I served as Delegation Assistant and local community leader from 2016-2019. In 2019 I was appointed as Delegation Leader. In addition to my service for the Institute, since I returned to Australia I have been working for the Archdiocese of Brisbane in their Vocations Office, accompanying young women in the discernment of a possible vocation to Religious Life. I have also been ministering as the State Spiritual Advisor for the St Vincent de Paul Society Queensland, giving me an opportunity to help in formation of members in their outreach to the marginalised.

I look forward to the opportunity to walk with my Sisters in this new season of my journey as a Canossian Sister. I bring myself, as I am, human and spiritual, and trust that with God, this is enough.



MESSAGE FROM MOTHER MELISSA AT THE END OF THE CHAPTER

During these days, we have been continually called to be women of the Word, women whose desire for mission begins and ends with our personal relationship with God in prayer. As I've sat and often wrestled with Jesus during these days, the invitation to be women of relationships, women who are both human and spiritual, has been significant.

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ADDRESS OF THE HOLY FATHER FRANCIS TO PARTICIPANTS IN THE GENERAL CHAPTER OF THE CANOSSIAN DAUGHTERS OF CHARITY

Hall of the Consistory - Friday, 26 August 2022

Pear Sisters, good morning and welcome!

I thank the Superior General for her greeting and for the presentation of this Chapter. And I thank the one who leaves, after eight years, and returns to her country. I would like to share with you some reflections suggested by the theme that guides your work.

First of all, women of the Word. Like Mary. Because women always speak, but we must speak like Mary, which is another thing. She is the woman of the Word, she is the disciple. By looking at her, and also by dialoguing with her in prayer, you can always learn anew what it means to be "women of the Word". Which has nothing to do

with "chattering women"! please do not confuse this. May there be no chattering among you! The elderly can witness to the young an amazement that does not diminish, a gratitude that grows with age, an acceptance of the Word that becomes ever fuller, more concrete, more embodied in life. And young women can witness to the elderly the enthusiasm of discovery, the impulse of the heart which, in silence, learns to resonate with the Word, to allow itself to be surprised, even questioned, in order to grow in the school of the Master. And the middle-aged, what do they do? They are more at risk - beware! -, both because that is an age of transition, with some pitfalls - the crises of 40, 45, you know that well -; but above all because it is



the phase of greater responsibility and it is easy to slip into activism, even without realizing it. And then you are no longer women of the Word, but women of the computer, women of the telephone, women of the agenda, and so on. So, this motto is welcome for all! To go back to the school of Mary, re-centre on the Word and be women "who love without measure". The word, not activism, must be at the centre

This is the second element of the theme: to love without measure. There is a saying that cites "the measure of love is to love without measure". It is a capacity that comes from the Holy Spirit: it does not come from us, from our effort; it comes from God who always loves without measure. Always he awaits us. God's patience with us moves me. Look how patient this Father is with us! This quality of being without measure is proper to God's love; and yet this love - says St. Paul - "has been poured into our hearts through the Holy Spirit who has been given to us" (Rm 5: 5). Thus, it is possible to love without measure by making room for the Spirit and his action in our life. And this is holiness. Women of the Spirit, like Mary. Let the Spirit carry you forward with hearts open to the Spirit.

In fact, the theme of your Chapter speaks of "reconfiguration to a life of holiness" - reconfiguration: the word is beautiful, I like it - and adds, "in and for the mission, today". Holiness and mission are constitutive dimensions of the Christian life and are inseparable from each other. We can say it briefly like this: every saint is a mission (cf. Apostolic Exhortation Gaudete et exsultate, 19).

The testimony of *Magdalene of Canossa* demonstrates this well. She felt called to give herself entirely to God, but at the same time she also felt she had to be close to the poor. In her heart, as a young woman, there was this double need, this double sense of belonging: to God and to poor, who, in her

case, were the people of the poor areas of Verona. Attention: it is the Spirit who guides her, through concrete situations and she lets herself be guided; she searches for her way but always remaining docile. Docility: nothing to do with whim, or stubbornness: I want to do this ... No, docility to the Spirit. This is the secret! And thus, the charity of Christ shapes her heart, molds her life on the model of the Virgin Mary, who said "ves" from the beginning, fully. Then she made the pilgrimage in faith following her Son and became fully a mother beneath the Cross. Magdalene's life was "configured" to the holiness of Christ, on the model of Marv. in the concrete missionary form dictated by the reality in which she lived. Her "yes", said not in words but in deeds, was generative. The Lord sent her some companions with whom to share the journey of holiness and mission. And thus, you have come to this moment.

I liked the number of novices you have: this indicates fruitfulness, fruitfulness of the Congregation. It is an indication of fertility. It's a shame there are so few people here in Europe, but it is the European demographic winter. Instead of children, they prefer to have dogs, cats, which is a bit like programmed affection. I program affection, they give me affection without problems. What if there is pain? Well, there is the veterinarian who intervenes. And this is a bad thing. Please help families have children. It is a human problem, and also a patriotic problem.

Dear Sisters, you want to "re-configure yourselves" today, according to this form of life. And the secret is always the same: let oneself be guided by the Holy Spirit to love God and the poor. But "today": it is the today of the Church, it is the today of society, or rather, of the various societies in which you are present. With those situations of poverty, with those faces that ask for closeness, compassion and tenderness. "Ah, what



a new thing you are saying, Father!". No, this is God's style. God always acts like this, with closeness, compassion and tenderness. He approaches us, forgives and caresses. Always. God's style is closeness, compassion and tenderness. Don't forget this. It is very important. I thank you for your courage and your generosity. I thank you for the joy of your hearts and your faces. Joy is one of the fruits of the Spirit and a clear sign of the Gospel, especially when it transpires in sharing with brothers and sisters in conditions of hardship and marginalization. It is joy. And also, in sharing with the Sisters in community. Yes, because it can happen that one appears full of enthusiasm in the service of the poor and then remains apart and does not live fraternity ... This is not a good sign, because they complain: "This superior ...", that person, that problem ... In my former Diocese [Buenos Aires] there was a nun who had this habit of complaining, and everyone called her "Sister Complainer". None of you are "Sister Complainers", but the temptation to complain, to criticize... this hurts the community, it hurts. "But, Father, I can't help it!". You must go and tell the person: "You have this defect"; or if not tell someone who can remedy it. But what do you gain by going to the other Sisters and saying: "But look at this, look at that ..."! This is chatter, which hurts so much and kills the Word of God. "It is difficult, Father, to solve the chatter problem, because a negative comment comes so easily to you ...". But there is a good remedy, against chatter, and it is very simple: if you are tempted to complain about others, bite your tongue, so it swells up and you will not be able to speak. Have you understood? Please, no complaining, this kills community life.

I would like to add two things. The first concerns the community dimension, and I take it from the Exhortation Gaudete et exsultate. «Sanctification is a community journey [...]. Living and working with others is undoubtedly a way of spiritual growth. [...]

Sharing the Word and celebrating the Eucharist together makes us more brothers [and sisters] and gradually transforms us into a holy and missionary community "(141-142). Let us not think about big things, but rather about everyday details. As in the family, it is there that charity is seen: "The community that preserves the small details of love, where the members take care of each other and guard an open and evangelizing environment, is the place where the Risen Lord is present sanctifying it according to the Father's plan" (145). Take care of this in your communities: one for the other. And no gossiping.

The second point, with which I conclude, is that of the importance of the prayer of adoration. We have forgotten the prayer of adoration: we know what it is, but we don't practice it as much. To worship. To worship. In silence, before the Lord, before the Blessed Sacrament, adore. Prayer of adoration. And here again you can refer to the testimony of your Foundress, who, like other Saints of charity, drew apostolic impetus especially from remaining in adoration in the presence of the Lord. Don't be afraid to worship: go there. "But, it's boring ...". Go and worship. Let the Lord act. The movement of the spirit that de-centres itself to centre itself on Christ - and this is adoration: de-centring is what makes service to one's neighbour possible, which is not piety or social assistance, but openness to others, proximity, sharing. In a word: charity. Saint Paul would say: "The love of Christ binds us and impels us" (cf. 2 Cor 5:14).

Dear sisters, go forward, take courage! I thank you for this visit, and above all for what you are and what you do in the Church. I ask the Holy Spirit to give you light and strength to conclude your Chapter well and for the journey of the Institute. I cordially bless you and all the Sisters in every part of the world. And please don't forget to pray for me!

The General Chapter; Our audience with Pope Francis

days that leaves an indelible mark on our minds and hearts.

It is not every day that we can experience a beautiful and significant moment in the presence of Pope Francis, the "Shepherd with the smell of the sheep". It was not yet nine



o'clock in the morning and we were already gathered in front of the gates of the Vatican with a mixture of feelings: anxiety, joy, curiosity, and gratitude. We had to wait for Cardinal Giovanni Battista Re, brother of our Canossian sister Giovanna Re, thanks to whom we Canossian Daughters of Charity, gathered in Rome for our General Chapter, could have a private audience with Pope Francis.

There is no denying that it was indeed a privilege: how lucky we were that it happened to us! I cannot help but remember that that morning, unfortunately, some Chapter sisters could not join us for this moment of grace, because they were positive for covid-19. We felt so sad for them and their missed opportunity.

When you have an important appoint-



ment, you must try to be punctual, even more so when it comes to a meeting with Pope Francis! So, we arrived at the Va-

tican two hours early and it was an opportunity for a mini tour of St. Peter's Basilica led by Cardinal Re, before moving on to the audience hall. The audience, to our surprise, was held in the beautiful consistory room, and it seemed to me to be even more so for us as Canossians

because as soon as we entered the room. we noticed a representation of Christ crucified and Mary at the foot of the cross. Once settled in our seats, the expectation grew even more. We are to meet the Pope! Yes, he is a person like us but our faith and our love for the Church us: he is our Pastor, he is the one whom the Spirit has chosen to guide, feed, animate with the power of love, and witness his Church, of which we are a fruitful part. Although we had already been told what the protocol would be in the presence of the Holy Father, the wait continued to raise new questions in our minds... but in the end, we all felt a little calmer, because we know that Pope Francis has a free and spontaneous spirit. This was the spirit we all showed even when, a little before the scheduled time, Pope Francis entered the consistory hall leaning on his walking stick, but in his usual jovial way he looked at the whole assembly and smiled. This smile brought us all to our feet and we greeted him with loud and warm applause and the beautiful African sound of the ululation, expressing

joy and emotion. We were all very excited. Following the protocol, Mother General Sandra Maggiolo, addressed the Holy Father, expressing on behalf of all of us the joy of this meeting, "long-awaited and desired", and reminded us that we carry in our hearts "all our sisters of the Canossian world and the laity who share with us the charism of Saint Magdalene". The words addressed to Pope Francis by our Superior General were brief but intense. A true encounter presupposes dialogue, and behold, at that moment we were all very attentive in waiting to accept the words that the Holy Father would address to us. We listened as daughters. Among the Po-

pe's words, some expressions that I find particularly challenging have remained in my heart: re-centering on the Word; putting oneself again at the school of Mary; living interpersonal relationships and

lationships and service in the style of God, which implies closeness, compassion, and tenderness".

All based this is on a secret: to let oneself be guided by the Holy Spirit. It was a message full of images, recommendations, and encouragement to continue our journey as consecrated women. His words were spoken in the manner of one who, with simplicity and a sense of humor, knows well the situation of those he is addressing. continue our journey as consecrated women. After this exchange, we were led in single file, one by one, before Pope Francis for a moment of personal

greeting. As I recall it now, I think; how

much joy reigned in that room! A simply unique moment. When it came to my turn to greet him, I was moved (as I believe all of us were), and I was delighted by his simplicity and friendliness. After thanking him for his love and zeal for the consecrated life, I could not help but convey to him the greetings of my father, who had told me to tell him how much he loves him and prays for him. He listened to me carefully, then asked me for my father's name and gave me a rosary, telling me: "This is for your father so that he will continue to pray for me". It was certainly a moment of double joy!

I thank the previous General Council and all those who worked hard to bring about this meeting. Being with Pope Francis in the Chapter context was a huge gift, a beautiful and meaningful experience. I believe that for all of us and for our Institute this moment will remain in

the memory as a stimulus to persevere in our path of reconfiguration







AMONG THE YOUNG SISTERS: INTERVIEW WITH SR VANDA LUVITA

hinking back to the experience of the chapter

...what remained in your eyes? (the most visually powerful moment)

What remained in my eyes is the capitular sisters who came from many different countries and provinces. I remember their faces and names. Each one of us has our own uniqueness but we share the same charism and mission. Our presence in the chapter was the sign of multiculture that exist in the reality of our Institute. The Chapter reminded us to go beyond, from multiculture to interculturality. I saw the work of the Holy Spirit in this Chapter. The new general council elected who represent the different cultures were the sign of hope in our journey to live as women of the word who love without measure.

...what stayed in your ears (the most meaningful word)?

What stayed in my ears is the word of the Holy Father that women of the word is not women of the chatter or women of activism, but we have to learn from Mary. To love without measure is a capacity that comes from the Holy Spirit. It is possible to love without measure by making room for the Spirit and his action in our lives. Holiness and mission are inseparable from each other.

...what stayed in your heart (the most emotional moment)

What stayed in my heart is the friendliness and the kindness of the sisters. I remember the moment when many sisters got sick but the Chapter kept going on. Other sisters took care of the sick sisters and made it possible to join the meeting via zoom. We could feel that we are one Canossian family. I was touched when I saw the photos of reality in the world today. I remember the image of the good Samaritan who saw and had compassion. We were touched by the cries of the earth and the cries of the poor, and we were moved to answer to the cries. We have the mission to respond to the need of the world and the poor but we are called also to live in communion with the sisters near to us.

What did it mean for you, for your journey, to be one of the youngest chapter mothers present?

I feel blessed to present in this Chapter and to be part of this religious family. As a young sister, I was enthusiastic when we were asked to envision the future. What do I want to see in the Congregation in the future, then I have to realize it from now on. I am not alone but we walk together in this life journey.

What do you take home as a precious gift for everyday life in your community?

My community is a very small part of the Institute but we share the path of holiness and mission of the Institute. In everyday life in the community we may live the interculturality and union of heart, and be the good Samaritan for others in our mission.



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AMONG THE SENIOR SISTERS: INTERVIEW WITH SR. ANNAMARIA SERAFINI

he most striking moment: what has remained with you visually?

What impressed me from the first moment I entered the Chapter room were the round tables. A most beautiful impression from the very beginning: it spoke to me of equality, being in a circle together, dialogue, of the importance to listen to one another, of synodality, sharing, togetherness. It was a first impression that remained with me the whole time because every day I saw this sign become a reality.

The most significant word: what has remained in your hearing?

I heard a continuous, persistent call that was NEW, to live out of LOVE, in freedom and responsibility, especially towards the most vulnerable and needy. This was not only spoken. Charity was lived among us in many small details, especially with the sisters who in those days became ill with Covid. Besides, the theme 'Women of the Word' was constantly repeated calling us to place the person of Jesus and his life at the centre of ours. Without him and his word nothing would have meaning for us and in vain would be our every effort.

The most emotional moment: what has remained in your heart?

It has been the private audience with Pope Francis. What a truly family gathering. I sensed the Pope's ability to make himself a 'neighbour', to listen, to place his total attention on the person before him, and above all, I felt a deep oneness – the experience of the Spirit that unites us. It's amazing to be aware of this! And then, the simplicity, the clarity and depth with which Sister Sandra addressed the Pope and how he captured the essence of our charism and

how, as a true father, he invited us to live it with joy and generosity. How beautiful to be a simple Church that is humble, fraternal, open and joyful. How truly blessed we are to have received so much GRACE! It is up to us to share it by passing it on...

What has it meant for you, for your journey, to be among the most senior sisters present?

My participation at the General Chapter, at my age for the first and last time, was lived as an enormous grace. I felt it like a mature fruit, not for my effort but as GIFT, a free gift, longed for and suffered and, at the same time, fully enjoyed. I know that the Lord is leading my life moment by moment. During the Chapter I fell ill with Covid. In those days I could not be physically present at the assemblies but, with my heart and my whole self - also thanks to the technology - I was present at every moment. I truly suffered those days but then I understood what Pope Francis was saying: "Reality is only known at the periphery." In those days in which I found myself to be on the 'outside', I was given the grace to see the reality of our Institute in a different way. I saw that for the Lord what really counts are not rules and institutions. For him what counts is LOVE. It is for this that he has called us... to live in freedom and responsibility the beauty of giving Life in loving those he puts beside us, especially the most vulnerable and poor. It is this revelation that I can't forget and that draws me towards a continuous discernment in humility and communion. I ask this Grace for myself and all of us - to live in fullness of love, in openness, simplicity, wisdom and intelligence according to the Spirit. May he spur us on with his sweet firmness.

Eucharistic Celebration - Rome, 30 August 2022 (1Cor 2,10-16; Sal 144; Lc 4,31-37)

he General Chapter is always a moment of great importance for the life of a Religious Congregation. In the light of the Word, you have made a careful discernment during recent weeks, carried out faithfully and creatively, to interpret and make current, under the guidance of the Holy Spirit, the charism that was given to you by the Foundress, St. Magdalene of Canossa. The theme you have chosen for your XVII Chapter highlights the centrality of the word of God for your journey of sanctification and for the mission you are called to carry out in the world today.

The passages of Scripture proclaimed in today's liturgy help us to deepen the chosen theme and, in particular, the meaning of the first part of the theme: *Women of the Word*, "who love without measure". In fact, the Gospel passage offers us the possibility of grasping the strength of the Word of

Jesus and of highlighting three characteristics: it is a Word that teaches and educates, that manifests itself with great authority and frees from the evil one.

In the first place, therefore, Jesus with his word "taught the people", preaching the

good news of the coming of the Kingdom of God. His whole life was marked by a constant and meticulous educational work ever since, still a teenager, he engaged with the Doctors of the Temple. (*Lk 2:41-50*) Then in his incessant going from village to village to announce the King-

dom of God, chatting with everyone and offering each one a useful word for one's life, until the mandate entrusted to his disciples to carry his Word with the power of the Holy Spirit to the ends of the earth." (cf. Acts 1:8)

The value and effectiveness of this Word reminds us in particular of the Letter to the Hebrews in an admirable synthesis: "The word of God is alive, effective and sharper than any double-edged sword; it penetrates to the point of division between soul and spirit, to the joints and marrow, and discerns the feelings and thoughts of the heart. There is no creature who can hide from God, but everything is naked and uncovered to the eyes of him to whom we must render account." (Heb 4:12-13) It is from this penetrating and life-giving efficacy of the Word that your missionary commitment must also start.

The second characteristic of the Word



of Jesus consists in its being clothed with great authority. It is an aspect also highlighted by the evangelist Mark in a text that we can consider parallel, but with a non-secondary gloss: "They reached Capernaum and immediately Jesus, who entered the synagogue on the Sabbath,



started to teach. And they were amazed at his teaching: in fact, he taught them as one who has authority and not as the scribes." (*Mk 1:21-22*) How did he differ from the scribes? Why was Jesus' word so authoritative? The disciples of Emmaus say this very clearly when they speak of Jesus without realizing that it was he who walked alongside them: "he was a powerful prophet in deed and in words, before God and all the people." (*Lk 24:19*) What makes the Word of Jesus particularly authoritative is therefore the full convergence between his teaching and his works.

The Council Constitution Dei Verbumi makes this clear when it states: "the authority of his Word derives from the fulfillment of the work of salvation in him: therefore, Jesus Christ, Word made flesh,

sent as a "man to men", "speaks the words of God " $(Jn\ 3:34)$ and completes the work of salvation entrusted to him by the Father (cf. $Jn\ 5:36$; ms). Therefore he, by seeing him one sees the Father, (cf. $Jn\ 14:9$), by the very fact of his presence and with the manifestation of himself through his words and deeds, signs and miracles, and especially with his death and resurrection from the dead, and finally with the sending of the Spirit of truth, he fulfills and completes the Revelation."(n.4)

In today's text of Luke's Gospel this correspondence between word and deeds is evident by the fact that Jesus frees the possessed man with particular authority, so much so that - affirms the evangelist: "All were seized with fear and said to one another: "What word is this, which commands impure spirits with authority and power and they go out?"». This interaction

between word and deeds marks all the preaching and all the testimony given by Jesus and, consequently, cannot but be taken as an indispensable paradigm also in the actions of the Church, of each specific community and of each believer.

The third factor is the liberating force that springs from the Word of Jesus. The episode of the person from whom Jesus sends out the devil also makes us understand what power the Word of the Lord is endowed with. In fact, says the Gospel, «he sternly ordered him: "Be quiet! Get out of him!" » Jesus' word is a Word that cannot be tamed or silenced. He always

acts and produces effects of liberation from physical and moral disease, from the evil one and from all diabolical actions, from hypocrisy and from his presumption. If we analyze the effects of the words spoken by Jesus it is not difficult to see that they are also always healing

and liberating or in any case capable of leaving an indelible mark in the life of those who listen to them. The Church itself would not be credible if she were not able to accompany the proclamation of salvation with works of liberation and solidarity, in every age and in every context.

In a fundamental passage of the Evangelii Gaudium the Apostolic Exhortation which is a true manifesto of his pontificate, within one of the most beautiful and incisive paragraphs entitled: "Take the initiative, get involved, accompany, bear fruit and celebrate", Pope Francis recalls that without works there can be no evangelization: "Let us dare a little more to take the initiative! As a consequence, the Church knows how to "get involved". Jesus washed the feet of his disciples. The Lord gets involved and involves his own, kneeling in front of the



others to wash them. But immediately afterwards he says to the disciples: "You will be blessed if you do this". (*In 13:17*) The evangelizing community places itself through works and gestures in the daily life of others, shortens distances, lowers itself to the point of humiliation if necessary, and takes on human life, touching the suffering flesh of Christ in the people. The evangelizers thus have the "smell of sheep" and these listen to their voice. " (n. 24).

In the light of these considerations that made us grasp a few fundamental dimensions of the word of God, the commitment to be Women of the Word, "who love without measure", represents a fascinating task that you have the responsibility to translate into concrete paths of witness and of missionary commitment for your religious family. It is an exercise that asks you to make the peculiarity of your being consecrated women shine, bearers of special gifts and sensibilities. At a time when the Church is committed to enhancing the contribution of women, your charism can be of great help in developing and deepening decisive aspects for the mission of the Church.

I am thinking in particular of the educational task which, since the birth of your Congregation, has seen you spend your best energy on the education and formation of the younger generations, paying attention to those who have greater difficulties. In the context of the "Global Educational Pact" promoted by Pope Francis, this task not only remains current, but becomes even more urgent and prophetic for the mission of the Church. Therefore, the contribution that you have made is great and that you can certainly continue to give, especially in those regions of the world where it is not easy to guarantee a public Christian presence and manage educational institutions.

But your charism also leads you to experiment with new forms of pastoral collaboration with parish and diocesan realities in the field of religious education and catechesis. We live in a time of profound transformations that are bringing about a real change of era, as Pope Francis often reminds us. His words are prophetic and today in the face of the pandemic, the climatic upheavals, the phenomenon of migration, the various conflicts and the war in Ukraine, we grasp its full significance

and urgent relevance. The Church is asked to be courageous and to undertake new paths evangelizafor tion. You, with your "hearts of women", intrepid and rich in tenderness, maternal and generative, intuitive and determined,





guided by the Word received with faith and made to resonate in community life, can profoundly affect the renewal of the Church, Your Foundress, Saint Magdalene, your teacher and guide, was not afraid to leave her security to serve the neediest "by loving without measure" according to the heart of Christ. As Pope Francis reminded you in the audience on 26th August: «Magdalene's life was "configured "to the holiness of Christ, according to the model of Mary, in the concrete missionary form dictated by the reality in which she lived. And this "yes" of hers, said not in words but in deeds, was generative».

Speaking to the International Union of Superiors General (IUSG) last 5th May, the Holy Father indicated the attitude that must be assumed, starting from Jesus washing the feet of the disciples. «At the feet of humanity there is a theological space, and we need to relocate ourselves there. Therefore, if our vocation is to follow the steps of Jesus, and do it "closely", every time that history and the Spirit reposition the Church and religious life in this place, it will be for us a source of joy and growth, an inspirational source that allows us to feel younger. Since it is from there, from below, that everyone can re-read his charism and his history». With similar words Pope Francis exhorted you to «'re-configure yourselves' today, according to this form of life». Reminding you that «the secret is always the same: to let oneself be guided by the Holy Spirit to love God and the poor. But "today": it is the today of the Church, it is the today of society, or rather, of the various societies in which you are present. With those situations of poverty, with those faces that ask for closeness, compassion and tenderness.»

Certainly, difficulties are not lacking of which we are all aware: from the crisis of vocations to the aging of the members of the Congregation, from the heaviness of structures no longer functional, to the current mission, to the difficult collaboration with the other components of the ecclesial community, from the complexity of globalization processes, to profound cultural changes made even more rapid and incisive by the pervasiveness of new media and social networks. It is necessary to move within this scenario, certainly complex and challenging, with great realism and prudence, but also with great confidence in the guidance of the Holy Spirit and in the support of the Church.

In fact, as Saint Paul reminds us in the first reading: "we did not receive the spirit of the world, but the Spirit of God to know what God has given us". It is this awareness that has certainly guided your work and has enabled you to enter into that "thought of God" which is a source of light and discernment to face the challenges posed by community life itself and by the mission that you are called to carry out today in the world. Therefore, aware of the gifts received and making your own the attitude indicated by St. Paul whereby "the person moved by the Spirit judges everything, without being judged by anyone", do not be afraid to face difficult choices and take on new and challenging tasks.

I conclude by renewing with you my entrustment to the Lord who never lacks his closeness and support to those who turn to him, as stated in the responsorial psalm: "The Lord is faithful in all his words and good in all his deeds. The Lord sustains those who falter and raises up whoever has fallen ». Amen.


So, after listening carefully to the story and visiting the places blessed by the presence of the Virgin, we headed

CONSISTORY, FACE OF THE JOURNING CHURCH



With the consistory of August 2022, Pope Francis redraws once again the profile of the Church of the future. The Holy Father has conferred the role of Cardinal on pastors from the five continents. Four new countries will be represented in the College of Cardinals: Mongolia, Paraguay, Singapore and East Timor. The list of names confirmed the double criteria that motivated the previous seven Consistories of Pope Bergoglio's pontificate. On the one hand, internationality, with a special attention to the South of the world, and the overcoming of the seats once traditionally considered "seats of Cardinals" with a predilection for the peripheries, that is, outlying territories that historically have never seen a Cardinal. From 27th August, the College of Cardinals is therefore been made up of 226 cardinals, of whom 132 are electors and 94 are non-electors: 106 in Europe, of which 54 are electors; 60 in the Americas, including 38 electors; 30 in Asia, including 20 electors; 27 in Africa, of which 17 are electors; 5 cardinals in Oceania, 3 of whom are electors.

PAKISTAN HIT BY SERIOUS FLOODS:

Torrential monsoon rains at the end of August and the beginning of September 2022 triggered the worst floods in Pakistan's recent history, wiping out villages and leaving nearly 10 million children in need of immediate and life-saving assistance. This is only the latest of the tragedies caused by the climate crisis. About 33 million people, including around 16 million children, were affected by this year's heavy monsoon



ACTION PLANS FOR CLIMATE: A KEY CHALLENGE TO ADDRESS INJUSTICES AND INEQUALITIES IN AFRICAN CITIES

Fairness and justice feature prominently in the Sixth Assessment Report of Working Group II of the Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change (IPCC), published in 2022. The report focuses on the impacts of climate change, vulnerability and

adaptation. In its summary



for policy makers, the report states that "Inclusive governance that prioritizes equity and justice in planning and implementing adaptation leads to more effective and sustainable adaptation outcomes (high confidence)." This is a welcome development, albeit a long overdue one. The report offers ample evidence to support a focus on justice in different sectors and regions. It reflects the rapid growth of concern for climate justice - both in the circles of advocacy and in the public debate - and the

tion on this issue. Arguments related to climate justice include the need to address historical inequities, to challenge established power, and consider different perspectives and needs in planning and implementation. Only by addressing these problems directly we will be able to achieve the Sustainable Development Goals and climate goals.





A BOOK TO RETHINK **LEADERSHIP AS A** SERVICE

"Leading for good: How public leaders, profits and nonprofits can thrive together" by Theresa C. K. Goh

The author of the book proposes the formula B.L.I.S.S. (English acronym for Behaviors, Purpose of Leadership, Information Detection, Shared Values, and Systemic Thinking) to guide and help people called to

There are about 115,000 students who are welcomed every day in the countless Canossian educational realities scattered across all continents. They are many, many, but there are still many more who are still waiting to enter a school where they can receive a hot meal, be welcomed into a clean and dignified environment and be followed by trained teachers who really take care of them.

We would like to do more for many more boys and girls. We dream of new classrooms and spaces to accommodate more, with desks and chairs because the floor is no longer the most suitable place to study. We want to guarantee all students the necessary learning tools: books, exercise books, pens and computers. We would like to ensure they have trained and adequate teachers to take care of the hearts and minds of these girls and boys. We dream of being able to support young people coming from poor families, in their higher education studies to become teachers, nurses and social workers.

We can do this in many different ways, because the needs and realities that arise are different.

Laripani, North India Scholarships for girls



Since 2011, the Canossian Sisters have started promotion and education activities in favour of the poor population of the rural and tribal areas surrounding the village of Laripani, a small rural village located in the Raigarh district, in the State of Chhattisgarh. Here, the socio-educational structures are very few, while the population is extremely poor and the local economy is mainly made up of basic sustenance activities such as livestock and agriculture. During their visits to families in the area, the Canossian Sisters met many girls who had interrupted their studies due to the difficulty of their families to meet the expenses that would give them the opportunity to become nurses, teachers or other workers. Thanks to the Scholarships, it will be possible to ensure a complete cycle of studies for 9 girls (14-18 years) who will thus be able to prepare for a dignified professional life which will allow them to contribute to the support of their families and the study for their own brothers and sisters.

Payakaraopeta, South-East India Evening school support centres



Payakaraopeta is a village located in one of the most backward areas of Andhra Pradesh. In almost all the villages of that rural area there are government primary schools which are not, however, able to guarantee an adequate instruction due to the serious lack of suitable buildings and equipment as well as trained and motivated teachers.

Considering the poor level of education of the children of these schools and the illiteracy of their parents, the Canossian Sisters have decided to start up three evening school support centres in as many rural villages: Calvary colony, Indira Colony and Payakaraopeta. Each of these Centres will ensure the presence of three teachers and three classes of 25 children. Thus, there will be 225 girls and boys who can thus be helped to overcome their learning difficulties. In each village, with the help of local people, an easily accessible building has been identified for all children to be used as a Support Centre. The teachers of each Centre will be identified and selected within the villages themselves, so as to ensure a constant presence on site, facilitate contacts with students and parents and avoid the problem of travel. At each meeting, all children will be guaranteed a snack, as well as some materials such as school bags, pens and paper.

Distance Support (SAD)

We want to promote and make known this precious form of educational solidarity more and more.

The beneficiaries of Distance Support are the many boys and girls who live in the countries where the Canossian missions operate, all coming from poor families; orphans, street children, child workers. It is a gesture of solidarity and concrete help that aims at promoting the development of the person and especially of children and young people in conditions of risk, poverty and marginalization in their places of origin. Thanks to Distance Support, Ca-



nossian missionary Sisters guarantee less fortunate children a quality education, mainly within Canossian Schools, without any discrimination. Each of them is guaranteed a snack and a meal on a daily basis, a protected and clean environment, school material and health assistance.

There are 1,004 girls and boys from 15 countries who can go to school today thanks to the precious help of Distance Support. By the end of 2023, we would like to be able to support 1,200 children.
